

Jessica Slowen is a song-writer and music teacher.

Currently Midlands-based, she was born and raised in Yorkshire, where her interest in music was cultivated. Growing up, she learned the piano to Grade 8 level, sang in numerous choirs and performed in various music ensembles. She went on to read Music and English at Lancaster University, then gained her PGCE in Music at St Catharine's College, Cambridge.



Jessica has held Head of Music teaching posts in schools across the UK, from Torquay to Nottingham, Wakefield to Coventry. Whilst teaching, she developed a keen interest in directing school choirs, organising concerts and writing & arranging musical programmes.

Jessica still teaches part-time, whilst taking an opportunity to focus on her own music and song-writing. She has collaborated with a diverse range of musicians, through song-writing and as a recording vocalist, featuring on several independent albums.

Jessica had notable song-writing successes in 2015/16, with four of her songs reaching the semi-finals of the prestigious UK Songwriting Competition, including her children's choir song 'No More War'.

In 2017, another of her songs 'Open Your Eyes' was used as the set piece in heats of the Last Choir Singing competition in Lancashire, with over 60 primary school choirs performing the song in prestigious venues, such as the Blackpool Tower Ballroom. The song was specifically written for a children's choir, with a theme of not giving up or being too hard on yourself in times of adversity.

Most recently, her song 'Share It' was chosen for the 2018 repertoire of the Blackburn Cathedral Sing Together project – a six month outreach programme that trains over 250 teachers and 3500 primary school children, culminating in a week of concerts at St George's Hall in Blackburn.

Jessica has a catalogue of songs spanning multiple genres, from Pop to Country, Opera to Latin, Rock to Christmas.
